Dame Black is also Expert Adviser on Health and Work to the Department of Health, England, Chairman of the Nuffield Trust, and Chairman of the Governance Board of the Centre for Workforce Intelligence. Dame Black is a past-President of the Royal College of Physicians, of the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges, and of the British Lung Foundation. She is also a Trustee of the National Portrait Gallery, and is a member of the committee for the Queen's

Awards for Voluntary Service. In November 2013, Dame Black was named one of the 100 most powerful women in the UK in the Woman's Hour Power List.
